EARLY AMERICAN ESSARYS

"[James Essary's] father came to America from England. James came to Tennessee from Virginia and lived at Kingston in East Tenn. and is buried there." "John Henry Essary and Phillip Walker helped load the caravans of covered wagons from the mountains of East Tennessee through Cumberland Gap. It is a well documented fact that the Walkers had migrated from England to Pennsylvania and on down to Virginia while the Essarys migrated from England directly to Virginia." ORIGIN OF THE TENNESSEE ESSARYS

Pre-Revolutionary records of Essarys suggest that Thomas Essary had several siblings and/or cousins in the central Colonies, and that the family was well established in southeastern Pennsylvania before the Revolution. Joseph Rasberry (1835) Essary told his granddaughter Lottie (1896) Birdwell that his grandfather was killed at Braddock's Retreat. A low point in the French and Indian War, this rousing defeat of British troops and militia near Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, occurred in July 1755. The militia consisted primarily of Virginians recruited by George Washington and other regular troops marching from the Virginia tidewater to Fort Duquesne in western Pennsylvania. Since Joseph's grandfather was said to be born in 1755, the story apparently referred to his great-grandfather (more generation-skipping). By the 1980's Pennsylvania to be the likely candidate for this sad distinction, but the hypothesis is supported only by the lack of evidence that there are any other candidates. James Essary's birth is often reported as Aug 2, 1715; however, the record, which was originally transcribed and published in several historical archives, states that in September, 1846, James Essary was 31 years old and that he enlisted on August 2.

In the United States the interpretation of historical documents is complicated by phonetic name spellings that include Ussery/Usry/etc., especially in the southern U.S. Though the two families may share an historical kinship, the New World genealogies of the E family and the U family appear separate. The result is that particular documents may be overlooked or misinterpreted for lack of corroborating evidence.

In Devon Shire, England, the connection of Essery to the earlier Esworthy spelling is generally understood and accepted. The original research for this connection came from Degrett Ancestry Research in England to John Usry, publisher of the Usrey/Usry/Ussery Bulletin in 1981. The family Esworthy is recorded in local parish records back to about 1500 in Shobrooke. Worthy is a place name suffix, and the place Essworthy is a hamlet a few miles west of Shobrooke with a recorded history known to 1283. Essary genealogy prior to 1500 has been proposed, but without documentation. Thos Esiry, 1-1-2

*My Dear Cousins,
The Tennessee Essarys is not a natural family group. It is merely a grouping of the Essarys who arrived in Tennessee by the early 1800's. (This therefore excludes the Essarys who migrated from Virginia to Claiborne County after the Civil War.) A few of them are of known relation, but for most of them their relation to one another is speculative. Original stories and letters from our ancestors are quoted here for your own interpretation.*

Documents for James and Thomas Essary are from unrelated sources, none of which suggests one person named "James Thomas." The early census records for Thomas (1755) do in fact accommodate almost all the Essarys named in this group, though family tradition insists that the father of some of them was named James (for whom there are no census records). There is a document, however, that names his grandson Thomas, son of John Henry (ca.1782) Essary as James Thomas.
